# KUDOS to Everyone Who Made CITR 2025 a Success, an Awesome Learning Experience, and a Sense of Community

here are so many people to thank. If you came to CITR, we are so glad you did: if you did not make it this year, we hope you will come next year because you missed so much.

Our instructors received rave reviews by participants. There were shout outs for their talent, their patience, their attentive teaching styles, and their generous natures. We had four new teachers to CITR ( David Tjarks, Tony Montoya, Doug Reinhart and Alice Geyer) and they did a marvelous job, even a couple first timers. It is a brave thing to step out and tackle a class. It takes so much time to prepare for a class and to create a class timeline. We welcomed back a couple of teachers who were not able to join us in the past few years, ( Bob Zettler and Dan Noble). And of course, our triedand-true CCC and PPW instructors, we rely on you, and we are grateful for your willingness to share the craft, time after time, ( Al Vigil, Polly White, Joseph Sikora, **Rob Summers, Steve Gurnett and Gerry** Canavan ).

According to **Rob Summers**, our expert registrar: 57 registered students took 152 classes: 48 CCC members, 3 PPW members, and 6 Non-members. There were 6 first time carvers or pyrography students this year. Registration took on a different timeline than in previous years: 41 people registered in the first week of April and there were a total of 50 by the end of the month. 7 added registrations came in May.

The Friday through Wednesday format with Sunday being an off day, seemed to be popular.



We also added two, 15-minute breaks before and after lunch. The chance to stretch and

grab a snack also seemed well received.

I am always amazed at the wonderful members who show up to set-up the tables and then dismantle the room and clean the Grange back to its original state. Seriously, thank you, sincerely. It is a huge task, however, with so many of you, it is carried out in no time. Kimberly McCoy helped with the floor plan of the classes and the movement of the tables was kept to a minimum. Karen Stalmann kept us quite comfortable despite the high temperatures by firing up the swamp cooler and having to fight with the very temperamental and slightly broken ceiling fans. Marlys from the Grange went above and beyond making sure the restrooms and swamp cooler were in working order for us. A huge sigh of relief for many of us.

Carolyn Vigil spoiled us all with coffee, drinks and treats. Then she topped it off with the annual Hot Dog lunch and even added fresh popcorn to the afternoon break time.
